

## Avoid buying hazardous materials.

This should be a priority in our minds, because we should be using materials that are safe for our health as a priority. There are many items emitting toxic in the air, and the only detection that we have with our senses is if the material causes running nose, watery eyes or other irritations. In the previous issue, we learned that there may be toxic emissions such as Formaldehyde, and there may be more (VOC, Aldehyde, Phthalates, etc), hence a GREENGUARD certification of the product will ensure that the product has low toxic emissions.

## Buy products that can be recycled.

There may be some indicators, or perhaps we may choose materials that can be recycled such as glass jars and tin cans, which we may easily put into the recycle bin.

## Recycling bins and facilities at home and in the neighbourhood.

At home, you may wish to wash and collect all those aluminum cans, glass jars and bottles before sending them to your neighbourhood recycling bin. This will be a way to help with the recycling effort, no matter how small your contribution




